At the end of the Beijing Games, London officially became the Olympic city on 24 August 2008. The Paralympic handover was on 17 September 2008.

## Frequently asked questions

### Q1. Where will the 2012 Games be?

The Olympic Park is located in Stratford. The majority of the venues are in Newham, including the Olympic Village, the main stadium, swimming pools, Velopark (cycling centre) and warm-up tracks. 17 of the 26 Olympic competitions will take place within 15 minutes walking distance of Stratford Station. ExCeL will also play a key part, hosting boxing, fencing, judo, taekwondo, weightlifting, wrestling and table tennis in the Olympic Games and boccia, table tennis, powerlifting and wheelchair basketball in the Paralympic Games.

Other venues around London and the UK will also be used for specialist sports, such as sailing around Weymouth, tennis at Wimbledon, and the football competition at several stadiums around the country with the finals at Wembley.



## Q2. What benefits will there be?

Newham Council is working to maximise the benefits of the Games for local people and businesses. The Games will:

- attract massive investment in Newham with greater private investment than would otherwise have been likely in the current economic climate
- bring new flagship sports facilities and infrastructure to the area
- improve access in the borough for disabled people
- boost London's tourism industry – 1.6 million tourists attended the Sydney Games
- create opportunities for local people, including 12,000 new homes after the Games, some 2,800 of which will be a legacy of the Olympic Village
- motivate young people to take up sport and physical activity
- showcase the strengths of east London – especially our thriving creative and cultural industries
- provide a focus for new local training and skills programmes
- bring state of the art 'green' energy facilities.

## Q3. Will there be jobs?

Thousands of construction jobs have already been created and there could be up to 12,000 new jobs as a result of the legacy development.

Newham Council has established Workplace with offices in Stratford and in Canning Town to provide a jobs brokerage service for the 2012 Games and other regeneration schemes. Workplace provides information on job vacancies; skills and training provision; support and mentoring; and recruitment and interview services.

Mayor of Newham, Sir Robin Wales, says: "The 2012 Games will provide a huge boost to the regeneration of Newham and we are working hard to maximise the opportunities for local people. Our ambition is for the 2012 Games to be remembered for bringing long-lasting benefits to the people of Newham."

## Q4. Who runs the 2012 Games?

The London Organising Committee for the Olympic Games (LOCOG) is responsible for preparation for and staging of the 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games. Sebastian Coe is the Chairman and President.

A separate Olympic Delivery Authority (ODA) is responsible for building the venues and infrastructure in time for 2012 and for their conversion into the legacy uses. David Higgins is Chief Executive.

The Olympic Park Legacy Company has now been set up to deliver a blueprint for the area called the 'Legacy Masterplan Framework', which will set out what kind of uses the Olympic Park will have after the 2012 Games.

## Q5. What is the timetable?

The timetable for key activity is as follows:

- Construction of utilities, roads, bridges – started 2008 to end 2011
- Main stadium started on site spring 2008; completion mid 2011
- Aquatics centre: construction started mid 2008; completion mid 2011
- Olympic village: started on site end 2008; completion early 2012
- Velopark: construction 2009–2011
- Media centre; started on site mid 2009; completion end 2011
- Legacy plan submitted summer 2011
- 27 July – 12 August 2012, the Olympic Games
- 29 August – 9 September 2012, the Paralympic Games.

## Q6. When can I buy tickets?

Applications for London 2012 Olympic Games tickets will open on Tuesday 15 March 2011 and will remain open for a period of six weeks. Paralympic Games ticket applications will open on Friday 9 September 2011. Further information will be released later in the year.

# Tickets for the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic Games go on sale in 2011.

Tickets will be priced fairly and will also include free travel on public transport in London for the day to encourage spectators to take in the festivities throughout the city. There will also be free events – including the Road Cycling, Triathlon and Marathon. These events will take place on the streets of London, where spectators can line the route.

## Q7. What new facilities will there be?

### • The Olympic Park

The Olympic Park – stretching from Hackney Marshes in the North to Stratford High Street in the South – will be one of the largest new urban parks seen in Europe, built around a network of rivers and canals.

### • Olympic Stadium

The main stadium will host the Athletics competition and will have 80,000 seats during the competition.

The Olympic Park Legacy Company has identified West Ham United as the preferred option to be an anchor tenant after the Games (this means that West Ham United will use the stadium as their ground but it will also be used for other things). The venue will be fully accessible to residents and converted to a multi-purpose venue for concerts, athletics and football. There will be at least 10 community events and 100,000 tickets to stadium events every year, as well as opportunities to work, learn and volunteer.

### • Aquatics Centre

The centre contains two 50m pools and a 25m diving pool and fitness centre with capacity for 18,000 spectators during the Games and 3,500 afterwards.

### • Olympic Village

The Village will provide accommodation for up to 17,800

athletes and officials, before being put to use as mixed housing, providing some 2,800 new homes after the 2012 Games. Up to 50 per cent of this housing will be affordable.

### • Hockey Centre

The Hockey Centre will provide training and competition facilities for hockey at all levels. It will have seating for 15,000 during the Games but will be relocated within the Park after the Games with a capacity of 5,000.

### • Velopark

London 2012's vision is for a multi-discipline cycling centre that includes a 6,000 seat Velodrome (reducing to 3,000 after the Games), a road track, competition and recreational BMX tracks and a mountain biking course suitable for use by all levels of cyclists. It will be a permanent structure.

### • Basketball Arena

This temporary venue will host the preliminaries of the basketball competition as well as the Modern Pentathlon.

### • Handball – Multi-Sports Arena

This arena will be home to the handball preliminaries. It has a seating capacity of 5,000 and will become a regional home for a range of indoor sports with flexible seating for up to 6,000 spectators after the Games.

### • Tennis Complex

Specially built for the Paralympic Tennis competition, the hard court tennis centre will be a permanent structure. The ambition is to use the complex to develop grass roots participation in tennis at all levels and for all abilities.

### • Media and Broadcasting Centre

State-of-the-art media facilities will be available in the 65,000sqm international broadcasting centre and the 45,000sqm main press centre, adjacent to the main sporting arenas.

## Q8. Will the 2012 Games be 'green'?

Newham are committed to a green games, and share the London 2012 team's aspiration to maximise sustainability through the phases of the Games – building the venues and infrastructure, staging the Games themselves and then long into the future – focusing on five key areas:

- combating climate change
- reducing waste
- enhancing biodiversity
- promoting inclusion
- encouraging healthy living.

## Q9. How will visitors get to the Games?

Around 500,000 visitors will spend time in Newham on most days during the Games. Newham Council is

committed to making sure that visitors have a great games experience and to managing the visitor flows so they don't significantly impact on residents' daily lives.

The Games will be served by 10 separate railway lines with a combined capacity of 240,000 passengers per hour. This will include the 'Olympic Javelin' shuttle service along the Channel Tunnel Rail Link which will deliver 25,000 visitors per hour to Stratford just seven minutes after leaving St Pancras.

Stratford and West Ham stations are being upgraded. Stratford's International Railway Station is now operating for trains between St Pancras and north Kent.

Jubilee Line services have been enhanced by 45 per cent within the last four years, and the East London line is now open.

The Docklands Light Railway (DLR) is set to play an enhanced role too:

- A new route is being built between Canning Town and the Stratford

International Station

- Three car operation will boost capacity.

It is estimated that additional demand from holding the Games will be no more than five per cent of normal weekday travel. This is at a time when normal demand is down by over 15 per cent due to the summer holidays.

Most people attending the events will be heading in the opposite direction to commuters. Cars will be discouraged from the Games sites.

Hosting the Paralympic Games, with its thousands of athletes, will improve the way the city functions for all disabled people.

## Q10. How are the 2012 Games funded?

The Government has estimated that the public cost of the London Games will be in the region of £9.298billion. These costs will be broken down as follows:

- £7.2bn to the Olympic Delivery Authority, of which
- £600m for athlete's village

- £135m for media centre
- £1.1bn contingency
- £840m tax
- £390m for sport and Paralympics.

The Games themselves are expected to make £2.45billion in revenue from television rights, from ticket sales and through private sector sponsorship.

## Q11. What will happen to the venues after the 2012 Games?

The Olympic Park Legacy Company will have responsibility for the venues and the parklands after the 2012 Games are over. They will ensure that the legacy aims are delivered.

### Q12. How will I get around during the Games?

There is a lot of work being done to minimise disruption and improve the transport networks in London. The main impact will be confined to quite localised areas. The most affected will be: Stratford Station, Meridian Square and the Westfield complex; West Ham station, Manor Road and the Greenway going north; and the area around the ExCeL centre. In these areas, the transport planners are working to try to minimise any inconvenience, but there will inevitably be more congestion.

Outside of these areas there should only be minimal impact and disruption.
