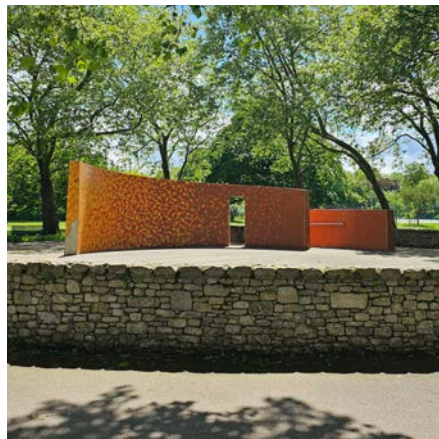

About the area

The Stratford & West Ham Community Neighbourhood has changed rapidly over the years, from the most deprived area into the most regenerated and best-connected district.

The neighbourhood has a vibrant business community and excellent transport links, which contributes to the local economy through generating new work opportunities, tourism, cultural and leisure activities.



Stratford Park

Transport

Stratford is a major multi-level interchange station served by the London Underground, London Overground, Docklands Light Railway (DLR) and is also a National Rail station on the West Anglia Main Line and the Great Eastern Main Line. It is the busiest station on the Tube network that is not located in Travelcard Zone 1 and UK's fifth most used station. West Ham station on Manor Road is served by the London Underground Jubilee, Hammersmith and City and District tube lines.

Community facilities

The key community spaces in the neighbourhood include Stratford Library, Old Town Hall Stratford, Chandos Community Centre and Vicarge Lane Community Centre. Our buildings provide environments that are inspiring, adaptable and designed to accommodate collaborative working, knowledge sharing and deliver community cohesion, social inclusion, community engagement and equality and diversity.

Other facilities include Stratford Park, West Ham Park, Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, two community gardens, Discover Children's Centre, Theatre Royal Stratford East and The Source (formerly Stratford Youth Zone).

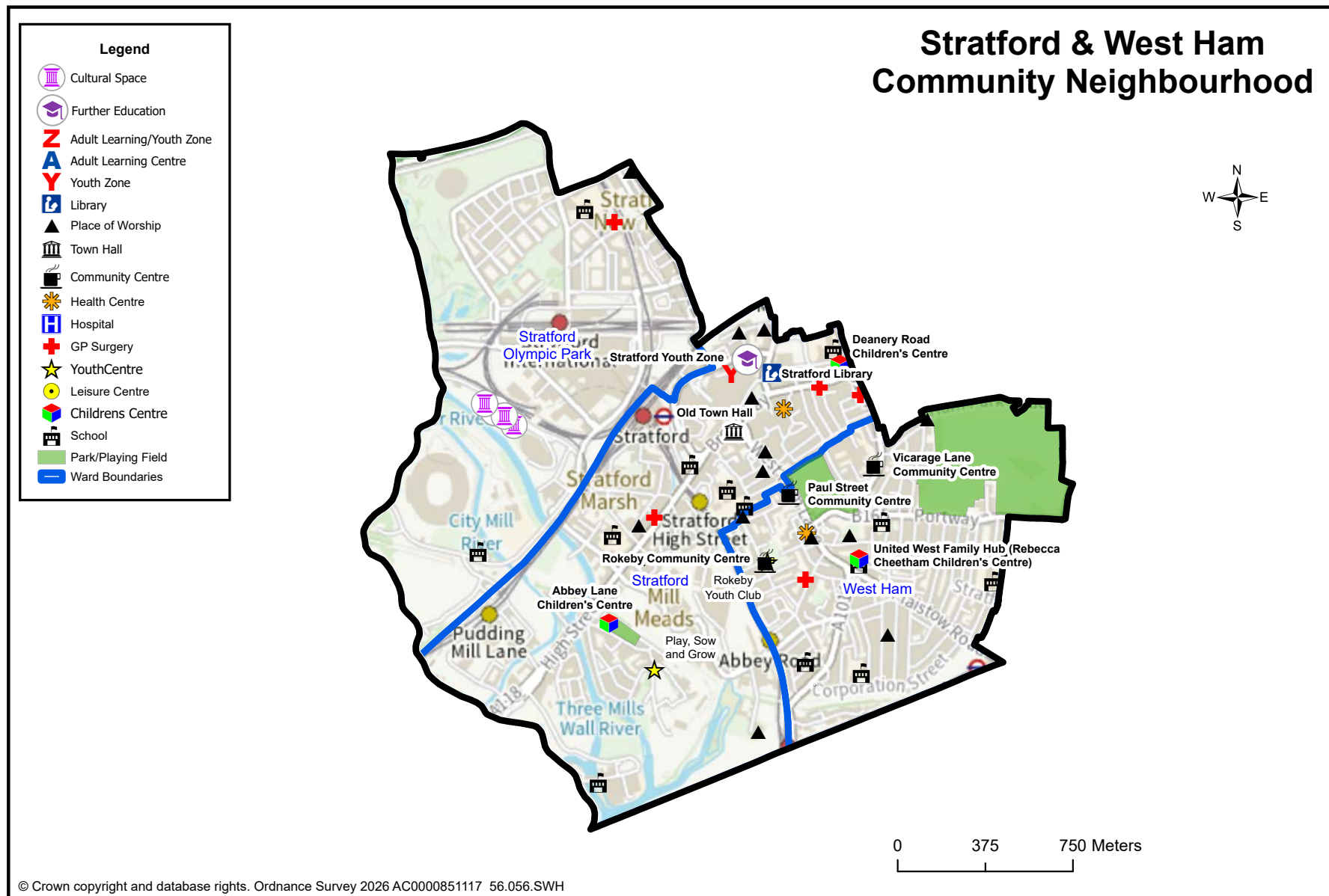

Neighbourhood map



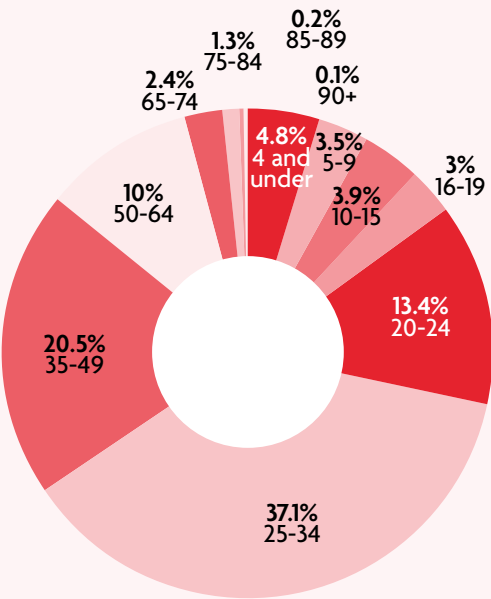

People Powered Places



Love E15 – Anti-fly tipping project

Overview

People Powered Places (PPP) is Newham Council's flagship participatory budgeting programme and one of the largest of its kind in the UK. Since launching in 2018, PPP has funded over 400 community-led projects, embedding co-production into local decision making and giving residents a direct role in shaping neighbourhood investment.

The 2025-27 cycle is delivered through a borough-wide model of resident participation. 120 resident Working Group members were recruited across Newham's eight Community Neighbourhoods to support the assessment and decision-making process, alongside 15 Youth Advisory Board members appointed in May 2025 to ensure young people influence programme design and approach.

In June 2025, 2,916 residents took part in setting neighbourhood priorities online and through activity in libraries and community centres. Our Ideas events were held across all community neighbourhoods between June and July, attended by 844 residents, where communities developed project ideas and explored solutions together. In September, 474 funding applications were received and assessed through resident-led scoring and feasibility checks carried out by Council services.

The Big Vote, held in November 2025, saw 11,139 residents cast their votes online, in community venues and through outreach sessions. PPP continues to evolve through innovation, including AI supported translation at hybrid events to improve accessibility and inclusive participation. Over 130 community-led projects will be delivered across Newham over the next year.

In Stratford, West Ham & Olympic Park, 14 community-led projects will be delivered over the next year, contributing to over 130 projects being delivered across Newham.

Neighbourhood priorities

Stratford & West Ham neighbourhood priorities for the 2025-27 cycle are:

Priority	Description
1. Health & Wellbeing	Reduction in health inequalities, physical and mental health, healthy eating, food growing.
2. Community Development & Participation	Strengthening community belonging, cohesion, local pride, volunteering, participation, and cultural or interfaith dialogue.
3. Community Safety	Improving women's safety, tackling crime, building trust, raising awareness, and enhancing day and night safety.

Community grants

Overview

The Community Grants programme brings together a range of small internal and externally funded grant schemes to support hyper local, grassroots and resident led activity. Through grants of £1,000 - £5,000, the programme helps community groups get projects off the ground that respond directly to neighbourhood priorities and local needs.

Neighbourhood Small Grants

The Neighbourhood Small Grants programme supports VCFSE organisations delivering local projects that address identified community needs. It focuses on small and emerging groups who may not have accessed larger funding streams, helping to build capacity and promote equitable access to funding.

In 2025-26, 45 projects received grants of up to £1,000, totalling £44,000 borough-wide.



Lyle's Local Fund

The Lyle's Local Fund, established by Tate & Lyle Sugars and administered in partnership with Newham Council, supports projects that help create safe, prosperous and healthy local communities. Grants of up to £5,000 are available to not for profit organisations whose work benefits Newham residents.

In 2025-26, £50,000 was available, supporting 10 projects across the borough.

Genting Good Causes

The Genting Good Causes Fund, delivered in partnership with Newham Council, provides funding for projects that strengthen local communities and improve wellbeing. Grants of up to £5,000 are available to voluntary, community and faith organisations, schools and charities based in Newham.

In 2025-26, £81,000 was awarded to 20 projects across Newham.

10,000 Steps to Art

Organisation: Sapphire Arts & Crafts
Grant Amount: £1,000

Sapphire Arts & Crafts CIC received £1,000 to deliver 10,000 Steps to Art, an eight week community wellbeing project in Stratford & West Ham. The funding supported guided walks in Newham's green spaces, primarily Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park, combined with creative arts activities including photography, sketching, printing, textiles and embroidery. The project engaged up to 60 residents, with a particular focus on women and global majority communities, supporting physical health, mental wellbeing and social connection. Participants explored local heritage and culture while working towards daily activity goals. The programme culminated in collaborative artworks and an online exhibition celebrating creativity, place and community connection.

Partner organisations

Overview

We work closely with Voluntary, Community, Faith and Social Enterprise (VCFSE) organisations to connect with residents and respond to local needs. Partners deliver vital support including food provision, advice services, befriending activities and community events, helping to address poverty, isolation, health inequalities and financial hardship.

VCSE partnerships

VCSE organisations play a key role in mobilising volunteers, attracting external funding into the borough, amplifying resident voice and supporting prevention and early help. Many partners have also been successful in applying for People Powered Places and Community Grants funding and are pivotal in delivering these projects. The sector is fundamental to fostering active citizenship, community resilience and strong neighbourhoods across Newham.

Some examples of VCSE partnerships

- **Deafroots**
Deafroots promotes accessibility, inclusion and empowerment for Deaf and Hard of Hearing residents through free weekly sessions at Stratford library, tailored support and community participation.
- **Ambition Aspire Achieve**
The organisation supports young people facing barriers through tailored programmes that build confidence, skills and opportunities across community hubs in Newham.
- **Frames of Mind**
Frames of Mind delivers creative digital arts programmes supporting wellbeing, empowering communities to develop skills, tell their stories and use film as advocacy.
- **East London Textile Arts (ELTA)**
ELTA creates community textiles celebrating cultural diversity, supporting wellbeing and skills development through long term, inclusive arts projects with local partners.
- **Stratford Original, Business Improvement District (BID)**
The Stratford BID unites local businesses to fund improvements, enhance the area and support economic growth through a business funded levy.

- **Community Gardens**

Stratford and West Ham community gardens are welcoming green spaces where residents of all ages are encouraged to explore nature and the outdoor environment (The Lighthouse and Gardens, Abbey Gardens and Park Village Oasis).

- **Bridget's Café, E20**

Bridget's is a unique café and training academy where people with Down syndrome or additional needs can aspire higher, support each other and learn together. The initiative broadens horizons, ignites passions, and transforms lives with warm brews with unique experience.

Faith partnerships

Newham is one of the UK's most religiously diverse boroughs, with faith institutions playing a vital role in community life. Faith groups provide trusted spaces for worship, support and connection, and are often among the first to respond to local needs. They deliver food provision, advice, wellbeing activities, youth work and volunteering opportunities, while promoting social cohesion and mutual understanding.

The Council works in partnership with faith organisations across neighbourhoods, recognising their contribution to community resilience, civic participation and early help. These relationships support inclusive engagement, strengthen local networks and help ensure services reflect the needs of Newham's diverse communities.

Some examples of faith partnerships

- **St John's Church**
Love Stratford at St John's Church unites families through stories, activities and community engagement, celebrating unity, joy and local connections.
- **Three Mills Church**
The neighbourhood team has partnered with Three Mills Church since 2017 on community initiatives, including delivering a Community Café at School 360.
- **Hope Church Newham**
Hope at the Hub offers weekly inclusive drop-ins supporting connection, creativity and wellbeing, funded by Active Centres and neighbourhood partnership.
- **Stratford Methodist Church - Bryant Street Community Centre**
The neighbourhood team collaborated on Ageing Well health initiatives and funded volunteers to help older residents plan future care, finances and housing.

Volunteering

Overview

Newham's Volunteers Programme is an established Council led service that supports residents and organisations to benefit from high-quality volunteering. Open to residents aged 16+, the programme welcomes people from all backgrounds, including working professionals, young people, older residents, people with disabilities, and refugees and asylum seekers.

Each year, over 500 active volunteers contribute over 19,000 hours across more than 300 opportunities, supporting activity within Community Neighbourhoods, libraries, community centres and wider council led programmes. Opportunities are also delivered through VCFSE organisations across Newham.

The programme works closely with VCFSE partners to help them develop meaningful volunteering roles and supports recruitment through a brokerage offer that matches residents to opportunities that suit their interests, skills and availability. Flexible short and long term options enable people to get involved in ways that work for them. The service is recognised for best practice and accredited with the Investing in Volunteers quality standard.

Volunteering across Newham

Pathways into employment

Volunteering supports residents to build confidence, develop skills and gain UK work experience. Through tailored support, including registration and DBS checks, volunteering can act as a pathway into training and paid employment.

Recognising and valuing volunteers

Volunteers are recognised for their time and commitment through the Tempo Time Credits rewards scheme. Credits can be exchanged for activities such as transport, fitness, cultural experiences and local attractions, helping to motivate and sustain long term involvement.

Christmas Elders Lunches 2026

Christmas Elders Lunches 2026 demonstrated the powerful role corporate volunteering has played in supporting older, socially isolated and vulnerable residents. Delivered at Stratford Town Hall, the event created a warm and inclusive festive experience for local elders.

Over 75 corporate volunteers contributed more than 550 hours, welcoming guests, serving festive meals, and supporting activities such as games and socialising. The Volunteers Team coordinated all volunteer involvement, working closely with internal Newham Council teams and corporate partners including Genting Casino, Tate & Lyle, Barhale Ltd, London City Airport, UCL East, Axis Europe Plc and Priestley Soundy to deliver a successful event.

Feedback from residents and partners was overwhelmingly positive, including: **"A huge thank you to everyone involved in helping to create such a joyful and memorable event."** The project highlights how coordinated volunteering can create meaningful moments of connection and wellbeing.



Other initiatives

Safer Stratford Partnerships

The Safer Stratford Partnership is a place-based multi-agency group operating under the governance of the Newham Safety Partnership (NSP). It was established to provide a structured, coordinated response to crime, anti-social behaviour (ASB), youth violence, vulnerability, and public space safety across a high demand town centre location.

The partnership brings together key operational leads from the Metropolitan Police, British Transport Police, Community Safety Enforcement Team (CSET), Licensing, CCTV, Youth Empowerment Services, Public Realm and business partners to jointly assess intelligence, agree priorities, and deliver targeted activity.

Its purpose is to ensure a consistent, data-led approach to neighbourhood crime and ASB, improve safeguarding outcomes, strengthen local problem-solving, and enhance public confidence by providing visible, coordinated action across Stratford.

Love E15

Love E15 is a community-building collective in West Ham that runs neighbourhood activities to encourage local residents' sense of ownership and pride in their area. One local issue the group tackles is fly-tipping by using art and creativity to "beautify" local fly-tipping "hot-spots" in the hope this will prevent rubbish dumping.

Diabetes Café

Stratford Library hosts an ongoing Diabetes Café in collaboration with UEL and Newham Public Health, providing a welcoming space for residents to better understand and manage diabetes through expert-led discussions, activities and healthy snacks. Sessions receive consistently positive feedback. Building on this success, partners will launch a pilot supporting adults aged 35+ through workshops focused on wellbeing, rehabilitation and building health confidence.

Exhibition space at Stratford Library

Stratford Library provides free of charge exhibition space for diverse local talent, offering a highly valued platform for creative expression. Each exhibition is accompanied by a programme of workshops, talks and inclusive engagement activities, including intergenerational and SEND-focused sessions. Exploring themes of identity, heritage and belonging, the programme is consistently at full capacity, reflecting strong demand and its growing importance within the borough's cultural provision.

Monthly Connecting Community Coffee Mornings – Community Wellbeing & Multi Partner Collaboration

In collaboration with various partners including universities, health professionals and local organisations, Stratford Library delivers monthly themed 'Connecting Community' coffee mornings, bringing together older residents, digitally excluded individuals and local families to reduce isolation and improve wellbeing. Co-delivered sessions cover themes such as digital inclusion, energy saving and mental health, providing accessible, resident-informed support that continues to grow in impact.

NHS Neighbourhoods programme

The NHS Neighbourhoods programme will bring together GPs, community health, mental health, social care, public health, and the VCFSE sector to work jointly for local people. Newham will be split into four localities, each with two neighbourhoods, to bring services closer to residents' daily lives. This model supports the ambition of the 10 Year Health Plan for England.

Well Newham

Well Newham is a borough-wide health and wellbeing programme that brings together information, services and support to help residents live healthier lives. It focuses on both medical and non medical factors that affect health, from mental wellbeing to housing and money. Delivered in partnership between the Council, NHS and the voluntary sector, it forms part of Newham's wider approach to reducing health inequalities.

Through a single, resident friendly website, Well Newham helps residents find local services and health advice that match their needs. The website has over 200 pages one can access depending on their requirement. It also features a dedicated events page whereby residents can find events and activities that they can participate in. Well Newham Directory of Services (powered by Joy)

The Well Newham Directory of Services, powered by Joy, is an online directory of all local health and wellbeing services available across Newham in one place. There are over 600 local services listed on the platform, from stop smoking to physical activities and support for children, young people and families. The directory allows residents to search for support near them and self refer to most of the services. Some referrals can be made only by professionals such as GPs and social prescribers. Over a thousand referrals are made every month through this platform. It plays an important role in making local services easier to find and access, while also helping partners understand demand and service gaps across neighbourhoods.

Newham Food Alliance (NFA)

Newham Food Alliance is an open collaboration of over 40 VCFSE partners ranging from large and long established to smaller grassroots organisations. These span Newham's geography, food cultures and social need. NFA partners run food banks, food clubs and the community hot meals programme. Welcome Newham One-Stop Shop: Stratford

The Welcome Newham One-Stop Shop is for refugees staying in Newham. It brings services and support together in one place to reduce barriers to access. Support includes, housing, GP registrations, universal credit, employment and onward referrals to other services. The service is run weekly at Stratford Library, 10am-3pm, no appointment needed.

Togetherness Café Mornings – Blossom Place

Regular community drop-in sessions are hosted weekly at the Stratford Library, supporting residents with benefit applications, digital access, and general wellbeing support. It is aimed at vulnerable residents and those needing help navigating services. Drop-in session timings: Tuesdays and Thursdays from 10am-2pm.

Mobile circulatory clinic by Stepwise Care

Stepwise Care has a preventative roving clinic that spots blood pressure and diabetes early by measuring the toe brachial pressure index of people at high risk. Screening is done in the Stratford area and extends across Newham. Referrals can be made by GPs, podiatrists or through the Well Newham Directory of Services (Joy).



Best Start Family Hubs

Best Start Family Hubs

Best Start Family Hubs are part of Best Start in Life, a UK government backed approach supporting children from conception through early childhood. The programme is funded until 2029 and focuses on helping children to be healthy, supported and ready for school, with a target nationally to increase the number of 5-year-olds achieving a 'good level of development' (GLD) by 2028.

In Newham, four Family Hubs operate from Shipman Youth Zone, East Ham Library, Manor Park Children's Centre, and United West Family Hub (working across Rebecca Cheetham and Kay Rowe Children's Centres). Alongside ten additional community access points, they form a borough-wide Family Hub Network delivering services in-person and online.

Expanding since 2023, Newham's Family Hubs provide universal, early support for families with children up to age 18 (25 for those with additional needs). Support is delivered through strong partnerships with children's services, health, and the voluntary and faith sectors, offering joined up early intervention and improved access to community services.

Baby Feeding Café

Rebecca Cheetham Children's Centre is a Best Start Family Hub location and the venue for the Baby Feeding Café on Mondays, 10-11.30am. Parents can attend the friendly drop-in, meet other parents, and get support with breastfeeding, bottle feeding, expressing, starting solids and more. If urgent support is needed, call the helpline on 07534 249 611.

Magpie Project

Magpie Project supports mothers and pre-school children in temporary or insecure accommodations in Newham. They have drop-in stay-and-play sessions on Monday and Wednesday mornings. They support families with essentials (e.g. clothes, nappies), case work and referrals, and access to joyful activities. Address: Centre Memorial Park, Grassroots, Memorial Ave, London E15 3DB.

Doctors of the World

Doctors of the World clinic offers walk-in information, support and advice to help people with GP registrations and to access health services. This service supports those who are vulnerable and not registered with a GP (e.g. people seeking sanctuary). Their advice line (0808 1647 686) is open between 10am-12pm, Tuesdays to Thursdays. Drop-in clinics are from 10am-3pm at The People's Place, 80-92 High Street, London E15 2NE.

Wellbeing sessions by Sphere Support

Sphere Support conducts wellbeing activities at their food club meetings. Free blood pressure checks are offered during lunch time on Mondays, which are funded by Public Health. Sphere Support is also a partner in the NFA, providing hot meals on Tuesdays. They also facilitate a mum's group to foster connection and give advice on childcare on Thursdays, 11.30am-1.30pm.

Carpenters and Dockland Centre

Run by Dockland Settlement, the centre provides valuable services to a wide range of residents in the local community. Weekly activities offered at the centre include sports and dance, baby sensory and choirs. It also runs a food bank and a community café which provides food parcels as well as sanitary, hygiene and cleaning products. The centre is free to use and is located at 98 Gibbins Road, E15 2HU.

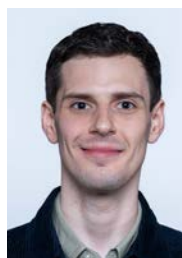
