



Scope: Building support networks and developing community cohesion

- Working group members- Dawn Babb and Rosie
 Stratford
- Traditional door knocking/parent meet
- 2 x Let's Start the Party grants
- 3 events: Richford Road (Car Free Day), Three Mills (Leggat Road Green Christmas Lights), Carpenters Estate
- 200+ participants
- 3 further resident consultation meetings to make the project sustainable












Project 1: Meet Your Neighbour

Project 2: Community Art Project: Supporting Wall

Scope: An creative art project in Carpenters Estate to raise awareness of knife crime, drugs and anti-social behaviour

- Part funded by City Airport and Heritage fund
- 3 x resident consultation
- 2 x Digital Art Workshops
- 3 x online pub quizzes
- 300+ participants
- 15 young people and UEL students involved in project
- Community Consultation to pick winning designs
- Installation of public realm art by UEL graphics department



















Project 3: Stratford park (ongoing project)

Scope - Make Stratford park a safer, friendly and active space through regular activities, improved facilities and increased use of the park

Projects include:

- 1. Community Poetry Café Newham Poetry group
- 2. Family Activities— Community Neighbourhood Team and Active Newham
- 3. Sensory Garden improvements and food growing sessions for people with disabilities—Parkside Project
- 4. Community Gardening Project 7th Day Adventist Church



Priority 2 Stratford park: Poetry Café



- Friends of the Park Group
- 64 weekly sessions (Café and via zoom)
- Weekly book swap sessions
- Total interaction : Direct: 1600, Indirect: 5700
- External funding: Pocket Parks, Culture Seeds Grant and Tesco Bags supported this project
- New kitchen, furniture, equipment, and planters











Stratford Park (Parkside Gardening Project)

Scope: To improve sensory garden and start food growing workshops







A) Woodland clearance to create a more open area and a greater sense of safety in Stratford Park

B) Weekly gardening workshops for adults with mental health needs

C) Food Growing Workshops will start in 2020





Project 4: Cleaner and Greener Project

Scope: To encourage young people to be aware of their environment and recycling

3 x education workshops were delivered in each of the schools:

- Park Primary school: completed (75 children) Year 4
- West Ham Primary school: 1 workshop pending (30 Children) Mixed Year 3-6
- Carpenters Primary school: 2 workshop pending (20 children) Mixed Year 3-6

Art work: remaining workshops (artwork) by end of October using recycled materials

Project 5: Young Families Project

(under 5s with disabilities)

Scope: Strong and positive relationships developed between residents from different

backgrounds

- 8 Health and wellbeing workshops
- 2 Field trips
- Parents developed confidence to support their children
- Weekly session set up at Rebecca Cheetham Nursery
- Integration into regular under 5s sessions at Stratford Library
- What's app group set up for parents
- Regular Coffee Mornings





- Free Family Learning sessions- Birkbeck University









Science Shines: Raising Climate Change Awareness

Scope: To Improve communication via simple science project-based workshop and the impact of air pollution on environment

- 12 sessions at Stratford Library
- 4 zoom sessions
- 15 attendees per session
- An additional pre-session for parents who did not feel confident working alongside their children or due to language barrier

Health Expo

Scope: 2 x Health and fitness programmes designed by young people from 7th Day

Adventist Church

- Free basic health checks
- Healthy Eating
- Taster sessions
- 150 people attended each event
- 10 referrals to link worker

Family Sessions: by Birkbeck

Scope: 4 x free workshops at Stratford Library for parents and children to learn about

the brain and its development

- 1 workshop delivered at Stratford Library
- 26 parents and children attended
- 4 x learning videos online, 296 views
- Information distributed via mailing lists
- Further workshops being planned

Update from service areas

Priority 1

Suggestion: Rough Sleeping in Newham: Response to COVID-19 and Beyond

Action:

- Rough Sleeper Taskforce set up to find a long term solution and support the rough sleeping community with care and compassion
- 24-hour Christmas shelter for Newham rough sleepers in 2018 and 2019
- A Two-year Homelessness and Rough Sleeping Strategy was agreed by Cabinet in December 2019. This is the first strategy of this kind in nearly 10 years.
- The Action Plan to deliver the Strategy was agreed by Cabinet in June 2020 (delayed due to COVID-19)
- Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, LBN accommodated 124 Rough Sleepers.
- In response to COVID 19 an additional 185 Rough Sleeper were rapidly accommodated from the street, with a further 40 moved from shared accommodation
- Overall, the total number of Rough Sleepers accommodated is 320
- The Stratford Mall is temporarily closed through the night following the granting of Court orders, which has resulted in the number of new Rough Sleepers reducing.
- The focus is now on supporting all individuals placed in these temporary accommodations to move on to more stable and permanent accommodation.
- Formal "Commissioning Intentions" for Rough Sleeping services will be presented to December 2020 Cabinet




