

### Priority 1: Safer Neighbourhood Clean Up £250



Community weapons sweeps in open spaces in the neighbourhood led by SNT

#### Activity / Event:

6 Community Clean up Crime (weapon sweep)
 walkabouts in wards June 2019-Mar 2020

#### Spend - £236

(High Vis jackets, communications, litter pickers)

#### Lessons learned:

 Current Crime & rubbish hotspots identified in neighbourhood.

#### Results/Outcome:

- Raised community awareness of local police safety initiatives
- An abandoned stolen vehicle, a motorbike, two hammers, cannabis & a baton weapon were taken off the streets.
- Residents in Russel Road and Keir Hardie Estate started street connections group
- Supported by SNT Police, residents, Faith groups, councillors.

#### Feedback:

Majority of residents (50%) agreed that taking part in Safer Neighbourhood Clean ups will make a difference to their local area.

- "Trees and shrubs need to be pruned everywhere."
- "We need to campaign for more police patrol in the area."
- "Great opportunity for residents to meet and have dialogue with local SN police team."
- Good turn out, interesting event, shame
- about the weather."
- "Need actions for improvement following what was identified on walkabout e.g.cutting back bushes, fixing roads and pavements."

Walkabouts in 3 wards

### Priority 1 Design Out Crime on Estates £5,000

Redesigning areas of LBN estates to design out crime and antisocial behaviour



#### Activity / Event

- 5 Environmental Visual Audits(EVA)/ walkabouts were conducted by Met police in 3 wards, informed by Anti Social Behaviour and crime incidents taken place there over the previous six months.
- 5 reports were presented with short, medium and long term recommendations for (Bothwell Close/Lawrence Street/Edward Street) CTS (Leamouth Road) CH, (Baron Walk/ CTN. Action Plan for Edward Street started March 2020.

#### Next steps :

- To work with LBN Housing Liaison Officers to initiate more action plans & interventions to design out crime on estates in CH & CT.
- Complete outstanding actions for all short term recommendations and assess with HLO's re: medium and long term recommendations.

#### Result /Outcome

Short term interventions carried out include:

- Overhanging trees, overgrown bushes cut back to improve lighting.
- Installation of new lights and upgrade of existing lights. Upgraded communal green space to reduce weapon hiding.
- Recommendation from EVA to demolish
   Bothwell Close garages being taken forward by LBN Regeneration.

#### Feedback

Positive feedback from evaluation forms completed for Baron Walk:

- "Feel safer with improved lights."
- "Good partnership working with LBN repairs and maintenance and SNT police."

#### Spend: £3,500

- Overgrown shrubbery cut back, wall rebuilt, green areas cut back, bollards installed, railings replaced, anti climb protections installed.
- Cost for Baron Walk £8,127 (but not charged)



## Priority 1 Ditch the Dumping £4,500



Prevention of fly-tip hotspots through local intelligence, data and interventions

#### Activity/Event:

- Installation of planters x2 Stansfeld /Jasper Rd
- Installation of Gabion planters x3 Memorial Rd/ West Ham.
- Ditch the Dirt projects (education and recycling themed mural to be installed locally with two primary schools x 2.

#### Lessons learned:

 Important to work with LBN Parks & LBN Enforcement

#### Next steps:

 Use LBN fly-tipping hotspot statistics to agree next projects.

#### Result/Outcome:

- Two informal networks of resident community builders owning the areas and preventing further fly-tipping.
- LBN Enforcement statistics show a reduction in reported fly-tipping by 50 % after installation

#### Feedback:

Positive feedback by residents around Jasper Close, perception that fly-tipping reduced.

Spend: £3,934

Gabions x 3 - £454
Education Ditch the Dirt projects at primary schools £1500





### Priority 1 Neighbourhood Watch Network £750

Newham London nunity

Neighbourhood Watch Scheme identifying & connecting residents to build community

#### Activity / Event:

- Regular meetings supporting resident coordinators to start and maintain new schemes through various projects and events (external funding).
- · Support and development of Green Projects.
- Identified 5 Resident Coordinators in three wards.

#### Results/Outcome:

- Distributed 55 personal alarms to five schemes: Keir Hardie Estate x 20; Baron Walk x 5; Russell Road x 20; Edgar Myles x 10, Memorial Rd x10
- Joint neighbourhood meeting with National Neighbourhood Watch
- Community connections through Green projects. (Russell & Burrard Rd, Custom House)

#### Feedback:

- "Just amazing, receiving the alarms', 'Easy to have at hand and very loud."
- Change name to Neighbourhood Connections.
- Resident Coordinators felt that name change, would have a more positive community approach.

Spend: £750

#### **Next Steps:**

 Support Resident coordinators with community events post Covid-19

#### Activity / Events:

- Christmas Fayre & Winter Market 27 Nov 19
- Rathbone Market (RM) Food Festival 30 Nov 2019
- Chinese New Year Celebrations 23 Feb 2020
- · Joint meeting with Plaistow Big Local.
- Research feasibility for independent bookshop in CH
- Conducted surveys with 20 local Businesses

#### Spend: £ 5,874

Christmas Lights & Winter Fayre - £980.00 Chinese New Year - £2,734 Food festival - £1,754.32 Independent Bookshop research - £1,000

#### Feedback:

- "Great to see local school children singing, joyful atmosphere, also didn't have to spend a lot of money'.
- "We had a nice time at the Christmas Fayre, hope there'll be another one'.

#### Results /Outcome:

- Total footfall for three events 1,250.
   Winter Market (700) Food Festival (250)
   Chinese New Year Celebration (300)
- New markets stalls to RM from hosting events
- Ongoing partnership with ECF developers, LBN Regeneration & Econ Regen, Tudor Markets, Newham Chinese Association.
- Raised awareness of Rathbone Market as a market destination.

#### **Lessons Learned:**

Learned how to organise community events.

#### Next steps:

- Continue events programmes with working group post Covid 19
- Continue business surveys.













## Priority 2 Pop up Premises £1,000



Support for start up businesses

#### Activity/Event:

- Five Food Hygiene level 2 courses organised in Canning Town and Custom House.
- 49 Level 2 certificates achieved by residents.
- Presentation Ceremony

#### Results/Outcome:

- List of 31 micro enterprises via food hygiene courses and Bring Back Business events.
- Residents have more opportunities to access employment and start up business support.
- Partnership with LBN Libraries start up.
- Good partnership working with LBN Newham Adult Learning Service.

Spend: £1,715

49 x £35 per person

#### Feedback:

- "So grateful for this opportunity from the team". I now have my Food Hygiene certificate."
- "Heard about the start-up workshops in Canning Town Library." "Helped me so much to start my own small business." "Thanks to the neighbourhood team."

#### Lessons learned:

There is an appetite for vocational training linked to employment.

#### Next steps:

- To organise courses in Custom House.
- To start working with LBN Regen re incubator units and start ups in Freemason Road.
- Continue updating the micro enterprise list and signpost community wealth building support.



### Priority 3 Green Grants - £ 5,000

Newham London m their local

(Let's Get Your Planting Started) Environmental grants for residents to transform their local environment and green spaces.

#### Activity / Events:

 12 successful Green Grants funding received by community residents/groups /schools

#### Results/Outcomes:

- 4 projects completed.
- 5 projects in process, delayed due to Covid-19.
- 3 school ones to start in September.
- Good partnership working with Greenspace.
- More residents value and respect their parks and public spaces.
- Green Grant applicants signposted to sign up for delayed community Clean-up Training Course.

#### Feedback:

- "Residents are already adding to their gardens by going out and buying more flowers and pots."
- "Shows how the green grant fund has contributed to an ongoing love of gardening."

#### Spend:

£ 5,518

12 grants approx. 500 each

#### Lessons learned:

People steal plants when in public domain.

#### Next steps:

 Ensure the projects are completed and work with applicants to access further funding to continue successful projects.



## Priority 3 The Big Clean Up- £2,000 Newham London

Community Clean up days, residents and stakeholders come together to clean up local area.

#### **Activity / Events:**

- 5 clean-ups between June 2019 Feb 2020, one cancelled due to lockdown (Covid-19)
- Community Clean-up Training day planned for March had to be postponed due to Covid-19.

#### Spend: £2,224

Tool Kits, Pop up Banners, Training for residents -£850, Cut back of Stansfeld Road £700

#### Lessons learned:

Essential to work in partnership with LBN Public space delivery teams in recycling, refuse and street cleaning to add value.

#### Next steps:

- To organise clean up training either online or in person.
- Organise friends of park groups, one park at a time. Agreed first one Memorial Park.

#### Results/Outcome:

- Approximately 90 people engaging with clean ups.
- 6 tonnes of waste collected including removal of white goods.
- Issued cleaning kits to support residents to lead.
- Positive engagement from local community builders and residents, leading the clean ups.
- Good engagement from service providers and Councillors.
- More residents are using correct processes for waste disposal.

#### Feedback:

Positive feedback from evaluation forms:

- "There's a lot of bulky waste so this clean up has made a big difference, thank you."
- "You guys are doing a great job, you have to do this again after 6 months."
- "This is great for the area."



## Priority 3 The Big Business Clean up £ 1,000



Business clean up days with residents, stakeholders along Barking Road, Freemasons Road, Fife Road

#### Activity / Events:

 5 Businesses had removal of stickers/graffiti and anti-graffiti coating applied

#### Lessons learned:

 A range of environmental issues raised from business surveys

#### Next steps:

- Organise additional 5 businesses to sign up.
- Revisit reusing recycled materials for planters for improving Barking Road high street.
- Start organising business clean ups in Barking Road, Freemasons Road and Fife Road shops areas.

#### Results/Outcome:

 Improved High Street environment on Barking Road.

#### Feedback

- "Consider Street Art on shop shutters?"
- "Please ask businesses in area to clean around their shops especially as Covid 19."

Spend: £ 1,182

10 x £118 per business front



Residents came forward to lead neighbourhood connection networks for Edward Street & Baron Walk from this project.

#### **Bring Back Business**

Effective Template for organising large events on Rathbone Market. Network of local small businesses who are now qualified to join events programme.

#### **Green Grants**

12 Informal networks of community builders who are keen to improve local environment and develop more green spaces.

Gardening activity packs have contributed to an ongoing love of gardening.



### Neighbourhood Connections/ Watch

5 street connection groups started. Ongoing community building and signposting to ASB support and reassurance.

#### **Pop Up Premises**

Local network of qualified residents who can access catering jobs and set up food businesses.

Informal working relationship with local business in Barking Road.

### **Priority 1 Community Safety & Policing**



- Improved communication between police, community and council-
- Three Community Safety Forums have taken place in August 19, October 19 and February 2020. Local issues were raised and informed an action plan. Been on hold since Covid 19. Regular email liaison with Safer Neighbourhood Inspector Malcolm Gillespie.
- Improve Newham app, make broader
- Now have revamped app Love Clean Streets Version 5 has improvements for clarity of reporting. Promoted on CH CT e-newsletter and wider.
- · Community ward panel meetings-
- Community Safety Forum pilot meetings informed action plan. CTN wards having had a joint meeting. Community safety residents action group set up in October 2019 to support partnership & joined up working.







### **Priority 2 Regeneration / Better High Streets**

 Communication strategy re: planning applications and emerging statement of community involvement.

- The Statement of Community Involvement was drafted and consulted on over the Summer 2019.
- The Planning Team are eager to have a greater response from residents. They have reviewed and responded to the responses they have received. There will be further consultation on the Statement of Community.



### **Priority 2 Regeneration/Better High Streets**



Communication strategy
 Re: Regeneration

 Consider Business Improvement District, liaise with planning team re: s106 funds, Community Infrastructure

- Custom House Resident Steering Group set up in March 2019, first meeting May 2019. Canning Town resident steering group set up in August 2020.
- Communication strategy includes regular newsletter co produced with Custom House steering group. Dropin shop in 25 Freemasons Road set up for local residents to discuss regeneration, opened in 2019.
- The Council has an adopted position the 'Developer Contributions Governance and Funding Allocation Strategy' which details how S106 and CIL are administered and managed; this was agreed in March 2019.



### **Priority 3 - Better and Cleaner Environment**



· Audit of LBN street lighting

- Work with Newham housing re; design out crime, partnership approach
- Walk the ward monthly with LBN enforcement and residents
- Love Parks guide to green spaces in 3 wards to encourage usage

- Received Map of street lighting in the neighbourhood informing where lighting improvements can be brought forward e.g. design out crime area, ASB hotspots. Baron walk area street lighting improved.
- Working in partnership with LBN Housing Repairs/
  Highways/Resident Liaison officers re: Baron Walk area/
  Edwards Street/Hoskins Close, Bothwell Close, Lawrence
  Street (see earlier slide) Action plans key officers
  important for joint working.
- Neighbourhood walkabout planned for Custom House Ward with LBN Enforcement, Highways, Parks, Street Cleansing & Cllrs. These walkabouts are one way of joint working between LBN Departments.
- Developing Friends of the Parks Group, targeting 5 parks out of 9 in the neighbourhood: Canning Town, Cundy Park, Keir Hardie Park, Star Park and Memorial Park. To concentrate on one at a time.

Maybe a gardening competition







Study 3 months and then act, if going well introduce to other areas

going forward we have a better structure that can be changed.





1st Cycle, lessons to be learned, Channels of Communication LBN Website, CN Neewsletter, Noticeboard, street banners

Internet not always useful, people struggle, Physical publicity, Noticeboards needed

Residents are not seeing the value for money - they don't get feedback, they are not made aware of things which are happening

55,000 people living in CN, difficult to contact everyone

the food hygiene course was very good, it should be rolled out to more people.

How are members replaced?

Spending - not use any external consultants but focus on the knowledge and expertise of local residents.

Projects signage

Not guided and led, questions from the residents





Activities chaneled via schools, children take home information

we need more people from all over the wards

LBN to think about how to get residents to be involved from grassroots.

Publicise via Newham Recorder, Newham Mag

the assemblies has a balance of people from different areas, or even have the allrs representing their ward

canvasing for representatives for different areas.

Communication, Agenda led by residents

To have residents sit in on LBN strategic meetings to feedback to local groups. Needs to be a clear line of comms between decision makers and those affected Childcare at Physical meetings to attract more families





good opportunity to meet the neighbours, cleaning the streets, good fun

There is still a lot to do and the more residents we target the more work we will be able to get done

Ways of linking the youth assemblies and community assemblies would be really helpful. Issues like shaping the environment requires youth input.

I think they are quite successful, I have participated in the food and hygiene training and that was interesting there were people who went on to having a small business

I think using the local library for activities is important for targeted groups who can depend on us - help them to get involved

Cycle worked well

18 months is the right amount of time, able to achieve in this time

I was a working group member - inititally it was slow and unclear, it's been a learning process. It didn't work to hold assemblies outside of the neighbourhood

Going forward the officers and councillors have learned lessons and it will get better

Could merge the youth work with the community plan work

There's a feeling that people aren't getting involved in local decisions. Only 66% of the population has LT access.

Citizens assemblies have been amazing - first time I have seen councillors, officers and residents working together open dialogue and the council is now accessible Continuation, budget could improve with continuation and changes being made, get more attention, excited to see projects continue





More things could be done re. the youth, crime and policing - we can't let our youth down

Change 1 priority? Continue with the most successful and change another

Roll out more across the area, seeing benefits, some people have no knowledge Being a local resident I have never heard of these meetings before now - Newham COuncil should be working to raise awareness of this - a lot of people have opinions but don't know how to help and who to talk to - I didn't know that this was happening I think we need to look at how we communicate with residents.





Better use of social media to publicise so people know how to share their ideas
