





### **Project: Bloomin' Forest Gate**







#### **Bloomin' Forest Gate Key Facts**

- Thousands of spring bulbs gifted to local residents and planted locally during autumn 2019
- 143 residents signed up to plant and promote
- 41 separate events and activities planned across March including gardening lessons, musical performance, art exhibitions, green themed kids science clubs, daffodil knitting, community clean ups and much more



## Bloomin' Forest Gate Key Facts continued

- Logo designs were developed by a local artist and chosen by the BFG project group
- Almost all of the activities and events were delivered by local residents
- The bad news: the program was stopped half way through March due to the Covid-19 lock down

Project spend: £2422.42



















### Outcomes achieved

- Approximately 200 local residents involved in planting activities to improve the beauty of the local neighbourhood
- Perennial bulbs will bloom every year, so long term aesthetics of Forest Gate improved
- An increased number of local residents are more inspired to improve the look and feel of their neighbourhood

### **Gardening Lessons Key Facts**

- Gardening lessons were repeatedly requested directly via the Citizens Assembly
- First lessons took place in July 2019
- Lessons also commissioned to be delivered during Bloomin' Forest Gate, to complement the programme of activities
- Additional lessons took place in West Ham Park, Forest Gate Community Garden and The Gate Library
- Project spend: £1132

# Gardening Lessons Outcomes Achieved

- Local residents more confident and knowledgeable about planting
- Residents bonded and cohesion developed through planting, sharing tips and joint experience
- Informal learning additionally took place during community planting days



- Developed in response to the Citizens Assembly
- 4 meetings have taken place so far
- Aspirations and decisions around key areas of focus were thoroughly discussed and agreed upon
- Newham Conservation Volunteers commissioned to treat and repair the animal sculptures within the park
- Project spend: £499.54




- Project group members carried out a questionnaire of local parents during the Party in the Park event in September 2019, to ascertain local need and opinion


- Project aimed at raising the aspirations of local young people and encouraging positive life choices





- Newham's Waste and Recycling team will be delivering a service trial in selected areas across the borough, including parts of Forest Gate
- As part of this service trial, residents can add additional items such as glass bottles and jars, plastic tubs, pots, trays, aerosols and foil paper to their recyclable waste, which will be collected weekly

It will great if these initiatives carry on, more investment




Hove all the planting, I run Woodgrange market and it all looks really good-laura

I think it is great that Newham is leading the way, but how do we reach the hard to reach communities. Give opportunities to other people not same faces.

It is logical, getting opinions, priorities and delivering projects





Working group members selected at random - going forward will those groups remain the same / will more people be invited / will we start from scratch?

I haven't really been involved, I went to an assembly a couple of years ago. I'm keen for CAs to be run as independent bodies rather than consultation exercises.

Using different modes of publicity, less typing/more visual, and using big advertising props such as Bus stops billboards.

I agree that it is the usual suspects but one of the good ways of spreading the word is via the Green Shots projects, The planting opens up conversations on the road. Talking to more people

The publicity for the Assemblies looked complicated was not inviting. More visual publicity for the diverse communities.

18 month cycle would work better as it is not always possible to deliver programmes in 12 months

It seems to have worked quite well. I will be disappointed if this process stops. Keep it going

HAs brought community together but much more important regen stuff that community could be involved in

I am hoping in the next round we can engage younger people more directly.





Sometimes it's the people who shout the loudest that get heard - issues with process

Smaller outreach sessions/ information stall three months before the assemblies in the cafes and parks

I was involved from the beginning, I think the cycle should be 2 years instead of 18 months as the process around getting projects together takes time.

I have attended assemblies this year, I had n idea about it prior to this. Library projects such as Yoga and Science, the library team can come promote the assemblies to the attendances.

Focus groups

More can be achieved with volunteers and shared resources. An idea for working with more projects. Funding could be allocated to voted projects and we could work on other ideas separately

Amazed that we only had £25K - need bigger budgets if we are going to do big things - too limited

There were other projects which were good. Give a chance to small groups to get involved and chose projects which can happen on the side and smaller different ways. It is more viable idea to achieve more within the allocated funding and other funds

I am interested to hear more about the youth assemblies





smaller and more frequent meeting to provide feedback to residents

Maybe there is something to learn from the Covid process. Has the Council learnt anything from reaching out to the isolated residents who benefited from HelpNewham, is there any skills we could use. Breakdown of budget will help us understand how the cost can be reduced

- Champions share this information with anyone in their community, however they want.
